

Soshanguve residents struggle with escalating crime rates, calls for action JUKULYN: Ambulances require police escorts due to high crime

Soshanguve's worst crime zone, where residents are plagued by violence.

Crime in Tshwane continues to destroy the lives and prosperity of many people, even though the Gauteng Provincial Government has made considerable efforts to combat crime.

Justice Minister Ronald Lamola has granted Gauteng Premier Panyaza Lesufi's crime prevention wardens the same legal status as Gauteng provincial traffic officers. Lamola delivered an update on the status of the 6,000 crime prevention wardens appointed by Lesufi and Community Safety MEC Faith Mazibuko in February 2023 to battle crime in the communities.

But the Gauteng Crime Prevention wardens continue to face criticism from all parties. They have been prevented from performing police responsibilities at police stations, accused of attacking residents, and are now being held accountable for the spread of crime in Tshwane Regions.

Now, the powerless wardens appear to be having little effect on crime in Jukulyn's high-crime zones. This area is called hell, and the residents are tormented by violence and crime. For safety reasons, courier cars, bread trucks, and ambulances in Jukulyn must be escorted by police officers.

The area has been plagued by crime in recent years as a result of criminal turf disputes over drug sales, and business owners have been forced to pay protection fees.

In a recent event two men, Tshepo Mosemeni, 30, and Sipho Kgomo, 33, appeared hastily in Soshanguve Magistrate's Court recently after being accused of killing four people in Block P. The tragedy has raised growing concerns among residents, given the township's severe crime rate.

Colonel Dimakatso Nevhuhulwi, spokesperson for Gauteng police, stated that an internal police report uncovered 80 empty rifle rounds at the scene, as well as 19 cartridges from a

9mm firearm. Community members gathered outside the Soshanguve Magistrate's Court, holding placards with messages expressing their displeasure with the crime in the area.

As a result of these crime elements, the community in the area claims that the police work with gangsters. The area has several police stations, including Rietgat SAPS, which has a satellite station in Block HH, and the Soshanguve police station in Block H.

he Soshanguve Ext. 4 community erupted in jubilation as their long-anticipated dreams were finally fulfilled; they were bestowed with title deeds, solidifying their complete owner-

ship of the RDP houses they call home. The MMC for Human Settlements, Cllr Ofentse Madzebatela, and MEC for Human Settlements and Infrastructure Development, Lebohang Maile, oversaw the allocation of approximately 580 title deeds to eligible recipients in Soshanguve South residents.

MEC Maile underscored the importance of safeguarding RDP houses and cautioned against their sale or the borrowing of money from loan sharks against their title deeds.

Maile emphasised that such actions not only jeopardize the housing security of future generations but also pose potential risks, such as criminal misuse of title deeds, which could burden the department.

"We are giving you houses here in Gauteng, where there are over 1.2 million people who require houses and since 1994, we have given over 1.3 million people houses in Gauteng."

With legal proof of ownership in hand, they embraced a newfound sense of security and assurance. community member , Michael Mgodi Hlatshwayo, expressed profound gratitude, stating that the acquisition of these documents would usher in a newfound sense of peace for his family.

He expressed delight and appreciation for the City's efforts in supporting the community of Soshanguve South Extension 4, noting that this development instilled a glimmer of hope for the future.



Tshwane Bahlali Dudula takes action against Rosslyn firm

The civic movement and anti-migrant group Tshwane Bahlali Dudula have joined forces with the ATDF ASA representing truck drivers, to initiate a march to DSV Logistics in Rosslyn. With their compelling slogan, "Youth unemployment is a ticking time bomb," articulates their unified objective: advocating for youth employment, fair treatment of employees, and the expulsion of illegal immigrants from the company.

Tshwane Bahlali Dudula proclaims, 'The time has come to rise and reclaim what is rightfully ours!' Their objective: to challenge the underpayment of drivers, unfair dismissal of at least 60 drivers, racism, and favoritism.

When questioned about the recent strike, Michael Maleka, the General Secretary and Founder of Tshwane Bahlali Dudula, responded, "We have sent three letters to them previously, and we haven't received any response. Only after we released the recent poster about the upcoming march did they decide to respond, attempting to halt the march and requesting a meeting.

"I visited the police station yesterday and had a conversation with the station commander, informing him not to be surprised by our actions. We chose not to apply for permission for the march, as we have marched numerous times to the president and his office without seeing any results."

"We march every day, sending letters, yet we receive no responses. We visited Minister Aaron Motsoaledi's office regarding illegal immigrants but to no avail. That's why we've come directly here to ensure this matter is addressed."

Sidwell Mgenge, Chairperson of the truck driver's forum and association ATDF ASA, elucidated the situation, stating, "The issue at DSV lies within the management."

"You see, we have our members at DSV. In December, the company was supposed to pay the drivers their dues. However, the company failed to do so. When the drivers complained, the company assured them they would be paid in January. But when they returned to work in January, the company still didn't pay them."

"They escalated matters by bringing in another white individual with a polygraph machine to verify the drivers' complaints about unpaid salaries. In response, we took decisive action, swiftly shutting down operations." Said Mgenge.

"I believe it's been about three weeks since we initiated the shutdown alongside them. Today, we attempted to meet with the management to address the issue, but they refused to engage with us, claiming they couldn't speak to us while the drivers were still waiting for their overdue salaries."

"We insisted, stating that they cannot simply ignore their responsibility to the employees who work for them; they must pay them. We delivered a memorandum to the head office of DSV, but when we reached out to them, they dismissed us as if they were unfamiliar with our concerns." Added Mgenge.

Mgenge further recounted that when the management of DSV Logistics arrived and bluntly stated, "We're too occupied to entertain your actions,. We'll address this matter at a later time. **Read full story online** www.tshwanebulletin.co.za




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

"We have a pattern of power outages and power never gets restored," said Moeti. A lack of necessities is a sign of a much bigger problem.

An agreement was signed on the same day regarding the resolution of the issue on January 26th, 2024. The electricity challenges persisted, and as a result, there was a strike yesterday.

The community activist, Obakeng Mokwena, said the load-shedding schedule is unknown to them, which frustrates them.

"As a community, we're angry because our electronics are broken and nobody can fix them, the groceries are bad. My appliances have been destroyed by the power outage. In response to our request for

assistance, the councillor said she did not work for Eskom." Mokwena said.

In a statement during the strike, Levy Ngobeni, a representative of Eskom Management, indicated that the problem had been resolved, although it was going to take a long time.

Despite many attempts to reach Violet Phalwane, ward councillor in Ward 30, she was not able to return to the Tshwane Bulletin to answer questions regarding the strike.

Residents believe that the government overlooks their needs and grievances. In addition, community leaders reported having more than four meetings with Eskom management in the past year.

"Every time we engage with Eskom, they keep on promising that our issue will be resolved, added Moeti.

Furthermore, Moeti said the community engaged in strike action recently, and the police were called on them. Eskom Management was unwilling to talk with the community until Captain Mnisi from the Ga-Rankuwa Police Station intervened.





Tshwane South TVET College commits to skills growth through Occupational Programmes

These programmes are instrumental in tackling unemployment and empowering young people

shwane South TVET College (TSC) has launched occupational programmes comprising of three integral components: knowledge, practical application, and workplace immersion. These credit-bearing initiatives are meticulously designed to align with industry standards and fulfill the evolving needs of the workforce.

The introduction of the tripartite component aims to foster blended learning. This involves apprentices alternating between the workplace and the Skills Development Provider (SDP) to learn. This approach encourages the integration of practical and theoretical knowledge.

The college's decision to initiate occupational programs was driven by the objectives outlined in the National Development Plan (NDP) 2030 and the national agenda to phase out N1-N3 qualifications. "Tshwane South TVET

"Tshwane South TVET College came on board offering fully accredited, credit bearing, and internationally comparable programmes. Making occupational programmes vitally important to the industry, apprentices, and all within the economy," said Joash Badriparsad Assistant Director: Occupational Programmes. An apprentice, SETA, an em-

ployer (the industry), and SDP are all involved in the programmes. The entry requirements can be met with a minimum of Grade 9 or N2 in trade theory studies.TSC offers the following Occupational Programmes, Automotive Mechanic, Boilermaker, Bricklayer, Carpenter, Diesel mechanic, Electrician, Fitter and Turner, Mechanical Fitter, Millwright, Plumber and Welder. These programmes help to reduce unemployment and empower young people as they can be offered as short courses. According to Badriparsad, young people aspir-ing to become entrepreneurs can be admited to doing short courses, which can empower them to open businesses. The completion of the programmes will equip graduates with a comprehensive understanding of the workplace environment.

"These notives encourage employers to absorb them once they have qualified. Occupational



programmes offered at TSC are apprenticeships, which involve training at the SDP and workplace.

These soft skills prepare apprentices to socially apply themselves in the professional world. The college wants to respond to the NPD 2030 in a way that will have a good economic impact, among other goals. Their goal is to raise the proportion of graduates from all occupational programmes now provided by TSC who are artisans. Additionally, they desire trade testing facilities for all occupational programmes.

For young people to find more information about the occupational programmes, Badriparsad stated that TSC features on all social media platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, WhatsApp, as well as the college website: www.tsc.edu.za.

TSC has 4 campuses: Pretoria West, Centurion, Atteridgeville, and Odi Campus which has admin staff waiting to answer queries and enrol people into the institution.

According to Badriparsad, the National Occupational Curriculum Content (NOCC) is broken down into soft skills, fundamentals, and core. The soft skills venture into life skills such as handling finances correctly, managing time effectively, etc.

"Occupational programmes have a ratio of 1:15 whereby for every facilitator there is apprentices pre-enrol. TSC has been offering occupational programmes since 2019 as Centres of Specialisation," said Badriparsad.

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TSHABALALA IMPRESSES ON HIS PSL DEBUT

Sibusiso Tshabalala, who hails from Soshanguve, made his debut in the Premier Soccer League (PSL) for Polokwane City in a DSTV Premiership match against Moroka Swallows. The striker was substituted in the second half while City managed to win three valuable points while playing away from home.

The lethal striker, known as Fabi, is admired for his aerial sprinting prowess and goal-scoring instincts inside the box, which caught the attention of Polokwane City during the January transfer window. In an exclusive conversation with Capital Sport and Tshwane Bulletin, Tshabalala shared the unshakeable feeling he had as the coach called him in to make his debut.

" Iyooo, I felt like I was dreaming just to discover that it was a dream come true; the feeling is truly inexplicable. I was very emotional and enthusiastic. I had conflicting feelings, but I was quite happy and eager to prove myself." The striker who wears jersey number 29 has revealed that it was a tough journey for him to make his debut in the PSL. He had to work hard to establish discipline and self-confidence. Many local players fail to make it to professional football due to a lack of discipline, and he emphasized that an athlete's future is doomed without it.

He also praised his former local team, Rinkase Best 11, for teaching him the importance of discipline in both his game and his life.

"Discipline is essential in football, and in life in general. Most of us players lack discipline because we don't know what we want, or we do know but don't understand the larger picture, and as a result, we lose our football careers.

" I played for Kasi's Rinkase Best 11, a team that instills discipline in players and ensures they are trimmed to be the greatest," said Tshabalala.

Lebeloane Claims victory as Club Clinches Titans Promotion League Title

Close encounters with victory in previous seasons fueled the satisfaction of head coach Frederick Lebeloane with his team's consistent performance in the current season. Holding the helm since 2019.

Lebeloane disclosed that the motivation behind their triumph in this season's league was fueled by the past experiences of narrowly missing out on the title, spurring them to overcome setbacks and secure the coveted championship.

"We were inspired by the fact that we missed out on the league 3 times after we had lost either the last game or 2nd last game of the season and it was hard to take in all 3 years it happened but we stuck to the process and our systems at the club and just added a few more players".

The coach who led the team to victory shared that there were nervewracking moments towards the end of the season, influenced by the disappointments of past seasons. The league triumph was no walk in the park for the Flying Eagles, as title contenders Adelaar Cricket Club pushed them to their limits, handing them a loss in the second round. Despite these tense moments, Lebeloane affirmed the team's determination not to repeat the mistakes of previous seasons.

"The boys were nervous but I believe that's only human and if the guys were not nervous I was going to be worried. The first half of the team was nervous because of the game and because they've been in this position 3 times already and didn't want to mess it up, the other half was nervous because they've been doing well this season and didn't want to mess it up too".

As his tenure as Head Coach comes to a close, Lebeloane praised the team for their hard work and the respect they showed towards him as a coach. "In all honesty, I don't have the right words to explain how I feel," he remarked.

"The players did something that no one has ever done before in the promotion league, which was win all first-round games with bonus points to set the standard and my vision of what a club should look like is what the players bought into and worked on it as a whole, they came as strangers but became family at the end which was part of my vision.
